Our Goals

- To produce career ready graduates

Challenges



- Flat funding for Humanities and Commerce
- Demographic decline in domestic numbers; falling EFTs in some Departments
- Funding per EFT very low by international standards
- Current TEC funding is EFTs based, no premium for quality (except PBRF)
- Government funding and government priorities are not always aligned
- Increased cost of compliance (earthquake, fire, health and safety)
- Need to maintain infrastructure; aging building stock

Continue to recruit the best and brightest domestic and international students; provide them with an outstanding education and a life-changing experience


